The study of political phenomena has attracted scholars from different disciplines (such as comparative politics, political economy, political sociology and political communication), who approach intertwined questions from distinct perspectives. The resulting discourses, however, rarely engage with each other, while a comprehensive understanding of politics requires the joint application of diverse theoretical and methodological approaches, as well as syntheses of their results. This year's instalment of our graduate conference, organised for the fifth time, aims to promote joint discourse and reflection by providing a forum for doctoral candidates and (post)graduate students engaged in political research.

The winner is awarded a gross prize of HUF 100.000.

"The workshop will cover the methodological opportunities and challenges of studying political elites. Starting with some basic principles of social science research, we will review and compare the advantages and disadvantages of quantitative and qualitative methods used in elite studies, such as SNA, archival research (text analysis), opinion survey and case study analysis. However, the workshop will focus on field methods (methods based on interactions between the researcher and members of the elite). Techniques used in the study of hard-to-reach social groups will be discussed. More specifically, we focus on problems of elite identification and operationalisation; probability and non-probability sampling methods; the challenges of unit- and item non-response; elite defensivity and the positionality of the researcher. Participants will be asked to design their own elite research (either quantitative, qualitative or mixed), working in groups, and formulate a research plan of 3-4000 words/group to be sent to me after the workshop for evaluation."
